June Inspiration: Choose Continuity

Although Robert Frost said: "Ends and beginnings -- there are no such things. There are only middles" and Ralph Waldo Emerson said: "Every end is a beginning," with the idea of continuity, the lines of end and beginning of leadership transition smoothly into the process of working the plan.

As I end the year as Governor 2011-2012, Mark Pearce begins the year as Governor 2012-2013. At Mark's years end, Ken Messer will begin the year of 2013-2014 as Governor and then Mike Beahon for 2014-2015. Because our district created a strategic plan in February of 2011 that allows for continuity and because we have worked as a team of Governors, our district will benefit from the important idea that continuity created by a strategic plan developed by the totality of leadership is more important than disjointed, unconnected ideas of one person's leadership year after year.

Victor Hugo said: "There is nothing like a dream to create the future." The foundation of the dream of continuity has been laid in our district. Our International President Kalyan

Banerjee at the International Assembly in January 2011 challenged me as Governor 2011-2012 to create continuity in my district so that Rotary can not only survive, but also, thrive. We have the model in place. My successors are the key to making the dream come true.

Each governor of District 6080 will have a role in developing a thriving district. I created the groundwork for developing dynamic clubs by bringing Club Visioning to our district. Mark Pearce will continue by creating the foundation for increasing the Rotary Public Image in our district. Ken Messer will educate us and develop the new model for utilizing funds for enhancing our Humanitarian Service by implementing the Future Vision Plan. Mike Beahon will tie all of this together and work with his leadership on developing another strategic plan that will sustain our continuity for the following three years. Together, we can ignite the fire of passion that can transform this district from great to outstanding.

In 2009 I had my first training to be Governor in Tulsa at the Zone Institute. When I re-

turned home, I generated the following list of 10 goals that I hoped to accomplish by the end of my Governor year. I would like to share those goals with you.

Overall Goal: To develop a vision and structure for our district to align it with the paradigm shift at Rotary International and the Strategic Plan so that continuity will flourish in our district making the process and plan more important than the position.

1. To focus on the first leg of the Rotary International Strategic Plan: Club Support
2. To bring Visioning to District 6080
3. To create a structure for District 6080 so that more collaboration and team work is developed
4. To work collaboratively with the DGE/DGN to build a team work model for District 6080
5. To educate the DGND when elected to help understand the collaborative experience and team work model

6. To develop a strategic plan from a district visioning process
7. To hold Director's meetings via teleconference to develop job descriptions and a strategic plan for each area
8. To hold Assistant Governors' meetings via teleconference at least quarterly to keep them informed
9. To establish a District Training Chair with the purpose of training at the club level so that club members will see Rotary beyond the club and want to join at the district level creating more candidates for District positions, especially for AG/DG positions.
10. To highlight the important role the Assistant Governors hold by expressing their value at DG visits and at district meetings and having each write one newsletter article.

If I view these goals that reflect the paradigm shift at Rotary International as the criteria for success in leading our district, then I can smile. If I reflect on the antiquated focus of Rotary from the past of membership growth and Foundation contribution as the criteria for success, this year has not measured up to years in the past.

My hope is that the groundwork of developing a strategic plan will give rise in the future in a way that will be beyond all imagination to the by-products of Creating Dynamic Clubs, Enhancing Public Image, and Increasing Humanitarian Service, which are increased membership and Foundation giving. Time will tell.

Robert Kennedy said: "It is not enough to understand, or to see clearly. The future will be shaped in the arena of human activity, by those willing to commit their minds and their bodies to the task." Mark, Ken, and Mike: I leave the district in your hands. Best wishes and remember what Benjamin Franklin said: "Diligence is the mother of Good Luck."

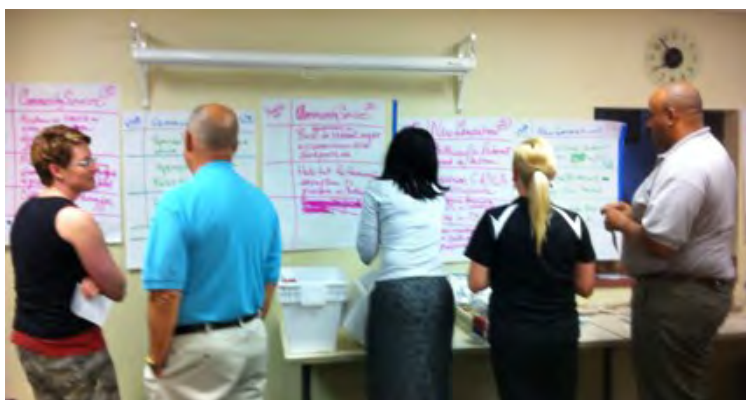
Visioning Creates Dynamic Clubs

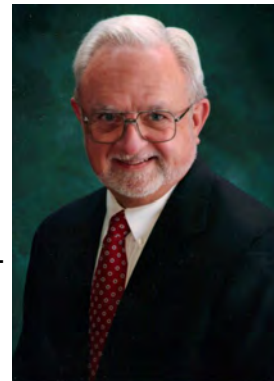


District Visioning Team at Fulton

Dr. Jon Hanson heads newly created Rotary Disaster Coordinating Committee

Since the disasters in Joplin, Sedalia, and Branson; our district has been alerted to the need for a Rotary Disaster Coordinating Committee that will function in two areas: Contributions and Volunteer Service.

First, Rotarians are generous and desire ways to give financially when a disaster happens. The district is mindful that when giving, it would be a benefit to be able to give and get a tax deduction for the contribution. We took the steps in April to set up the Missouri Rotary Emergency Relief Fund under the umbrella of the Community Foundation of Central Missouri (whose director is a Rotarian). Now when a disaster happens, there is a fund to immediately contribute to that will be under Rotary control and go to the area affected. A three member board composed of the District Disaster Coordinator, the District Community Service Chair, and the District Governor will decide on allocation of the funds.



The second area concerns the volunteer work that Rotarians are eager to give during those times of need. A page on our district website will be established to keep Rotarians informed as to what is needed and who to contact to volunteer to do service work in the area. Additionally this page will announce work days created by clubs so that other Rotarians or clubs can join the effort. The webpage will be effective July 1. Watch for an announcement on our Facebook page at www.facebook.com/pages/Rotary-District-6080. While you are on our Facebook page, please "Like" us.

Jon Hanson, a retired oral surgeon, has agreed to be chair of this newly established committee. Jon has been a member of the Jefferson City Rotary Club since 1985. He and his wife, Ann, have one son Peter. The Hansons have enjoyed hosting 2 Rotary Exchange Students, the most recent a boy from Spain, this past year. Jon enjoys gardening, music and reading.

The District will have five area coordinators to help Jon in times of disaster. They will be in charge of calling the presidents of the clubs where the disaster happens and to keep the webmaster updated on the needs of the area. Kerrie Bloss will be in charge of our Northern area. Susan Courter will head the Southeast area. We are currently looking for coordinators of the West area (Warrensburg/Sedalia/Butler/Harrisonville), the Central area (Jefferson City/Lake/Rolla), and the Southwest area (Springfield/Branson). This District position is a three year commitment. If you would like to give Service Above Self as an Area Disaster Coordinator, please e-mail Rita at esterly.rotary6080@gmail.com for more details. A teleconference is being set up to educate and inform those who choose to serve.

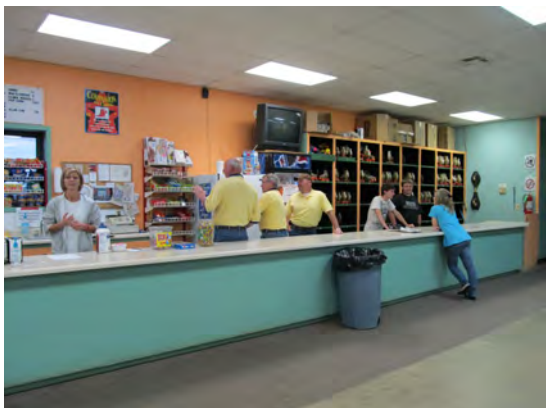
Mountain View receives Zone Award

Rotary Zone Director, Ken Schuppert, chose the Rotary Club of Mountain View as the best Changemaker Small Club in Zone 31. District Governors submitted data on the best small, medium, and large clubs in their district who qualified for the Changemaker Award. From among the 14 Districts in Zone 31, Mountain View was selected because of their commitment and diligent work in all five Avenues of Service.

Some of their service projects include the following. They held a Rotary Volunteer weekend at the Youth Center where they chaperoned and ran concessions for the Youth Center during a Friday night and Saturday night skating session. They volunteered at their District Simplified Grant Project partner's facility. After touring the Whetstone Boys Ranch, they did badly needed lawn maintenance and deep house cleaning in some of the rooms not being used to get them ready for occupancy. Mountain View Rotarians teach fifth graders to abstain from getting involved with Methamphetamine use with the Don't Meth With Me program. They have also trained Rotarians in other clubs to teach this program in 10 other school systems.



Additionally, Mountain View sends participants to Boys State, Girls State, and RYLA, For the past five years they have been involved with the Nature Park where they helped construct a hiking trail and identify plants along the way. They have adopted a highway to pick up trash. They give a \$8,000 scholarship to a High School Senior each year.



Their fund raising consists of their Radio Auction which they have done for the last 10 years to support the High School Scholarship and a Golf Tournament to support their other service projects. This year there was a hole in one winner of a Golf Cart at the tournament.

Mountain View Rotarians have contributed over \$200 per capita to the Annual Fund this year and the club has been in the top three per capita giving clubs for the past five years.

Congratulations to this small club of 21 members who make a large impact on their own community with their financial support and volunteer service and around the world by their contributions to the Rotary Foundation.

Can you imagine going to a Rotary meeting at 8:30 at night? Let alone staying until 12:30 AM? Rotary clubs in Italy are quite different than in the USA. Between 9:00-9:15 PM everyone finally arrives and the meeting gets started. It closes at 10:30 PM after which dinner is served. When the appetizers were brought out, I thought that was dinner. But, oh, no, no. Next came the pasta course followed by the entrée and then dessert. They finish about 12:30 AM. I asked if this is what they do every week. Yes, that is typical they told me. Of the four clubs that I visited, it was just like this at each.



The District Conference which they call their Congress was unlike ours. Whereas we discuss creating Dynamic Clubs, enhancing Public Image, and increasing Humanitarian Service, they discuss peace in the Mediterranean Sea area. The day of the conference, a bomb went off in a city 20 minutes away killing two girls. My GSE team was scheduled to go to that city the following day. The awareness of how lucky we are to feel safe in our district was extremely salient to my team and I.

I also attended the Clean Water Conference they held. I was asked to speak on our Panama Project. Our work in getting the appropriate water system that fit for the people of Panama dove tailed nicely with what the experts on water systems was telling the conference.

The GSE team is posting photos on Facebook and blogging. Be sure to follow them as they share their adventures in District 2120. Their comment to me was that this has been the adventure of a life time and I would agree.

Fellowship: A Core Value of Rotary
