# **Breakout Sessions at the District Convention**

By now I hope you have registered for the district conference and made your hotel reservations. The conference is being held in Branson on October 18 to 20 at the Radisson hotel. Here's a preview of what you can expect!

After a day of fun on Thursday, we will kick off the conference bright and early on Friday morning with a breakfast session. **Rick Tinucci** will begin by sharing his greetings from the Zone level. Then we will hear from **Pam Hunsaker**, Regional Director for **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library**. Rotary has a history of strong support for this project, which inspires a love of reading by providing books to young children.

Lunch on Friday will be all about Panama. We will hear a presentation from the GSE team from Panama. And then we will be joined by **Juan Carlos De Sedas**, the **International Director for the Rotary Club of Panama**. He will bring us up-to-date on our ongoing partnership with Panama and the service projects that we have been conducting.

At the banquet on Friday evening we will receive a message from Rotary International, as we hear from our **RI Representative John T. Capps**. John T. is well known for his humor and enthusiasm for the mission of Rotary. He was the Charter President of the Rotary Club of Morehead City-Noon and has proposed over one hundred potential members since his father proposed him for membership in 1968. He has attended thirty-five International Conventions and served as a volunteer Sergeant At Arms at most of them. John T. is currently writing a book on Rotary Humor and Stories.

At breakfast on Saturday morning you will meet **Roy Rogers Jr**. Roy Rogers Jr. (better known as Dusty), is the eldest natural son of famed western stars Roy Rogers and Dale Evans. Dusty's first professional taste was a small part in his father's TV series, "The Roy Rogers Show" on NBC, while he was a young child. Through the years he has appeared in numerous movies and TV shows, as well as having a successful recording career. Since 2003, Dusty and his band have been performing in Branson. Dusty also serves as the President and Executive Director of the Roy Rogers-Dale Evans Museum.

The conference concludes with lunch on Saturday. We will enjoy meeting our youth exchange delegates, and PDG Rita Esterly will present district awards.

### District 6080 Welcomes GSE Team from Panama

The 2012 – 2013 Rotary Group Study Exchange between Districts 6080 and 4240 of Central America has begun. After arriving in Springfield on September 24, the inbound GSE team traveled to Warrensburg for the first stop of their month-long tour of the Heart of Missouri.

Representing the home country of current District Governor Rodrigo Terán, the four-member team from Panama will experience Missouri culture, history and business during their visits to Warrensburg, Jefferson City, Columbia, West Plains, Springfield and Branson.

First and foremost, Rotary GSE is a professional development opportunity and the Panama team members will meet with their professional counterparts in Missouri during individual, customized vocational days throughout the District. The team also will make presentations at several Rotary clubs and attend the District Conference in Branson.

Rotarian **Julio Lavergne** is the leader of the Panama GSE team. Lavergne is a biomedical scientist and retired professor of immunology. He currently works as the scientific director of a technology company in Panama and his major research interest is the development and application of "green" technology for the improvement of human health.

**Dorcas Osorio** is an attorney who works as a research assistant at a private research and consulting firm in Panama City. She plans to specialize in alternative dispute resolution and will soon be authorized as a Mediator and Conciliator by the Government of Panama.

**Debora Hayot** is the administrative supervisor of her company's Logistic and Transportation Department. She has previous experience in human resources and an interest in several areas of administrative operations including personnel training and implementation of effective recycling programs.

Julieta Suárez is an advertising and public relations specialist who works as project executive for a brand marketing company in Panama City. She also co-owns and directs an events organization agency named Incomparable Eventos.

Rotary District 4240 has a total of 53 clubs with more than 1,250 members in Costa Rica, Nicaragua, El Salvador and Panama. There are 14 clubs and more than 500 Rotarians in Panama. An outbound team from District 6080 will visit all four countries of District 4240 in April 2013 to conclude the Rotary Group Study Exchange.

# The Rotary Foundation

Our Rotary Foundation began 'Doing Good in the World' in 1947 when the first disbursement of funds was granted to Rotary Scholars to study in another country. So our initial direction was education, which remains one of the three important programs of Our Rotary Foundation today. In the intervening years \$532,000,000 has been given to more than 41,000 Rotary/Ambassadorial Scholars. During 2010-2011 \$9,600,000 was granted to 384 Ambassadorial Scholars (\$25,000 each, for one year of University study). Contact Scholar Chair Melvin Platt.

Humanitarian grants are the second important program of Our Rotary Foundation. District 6080 has \$15,000 District Designated Funds (DDF) available for Matching Grants this year. Successful Rotary clubs are expected to contribute funds in an amount equal to the requested DDF (\$5,000 minimum). Contact Matching Grants Chair Susan Hart.

District Simplified Grant awards totaling \$25,000 DDF was recently reported to Rotary clubs (\$1,000 DDF each). Clubs received \$1,000 DDF match for \$1,000 cash contribution to a humanitarian project.

PolioPlus is the third major program of Our Rotary Foundation. As District PolioPlus Chair Dr. Ted Groshong says in a missive within this month's newsletter, 'We really are this close'.

#### INTERIM GIVING REPORT

To date, 26 of 50 Rotary clubs have contributed a total of \$56,982 to the Annual Programs Fund. Our District benchmark for the year is \$300,000, or \$100 per Rotarian each year. Please forward your contributions as early as possible. What we contribute this year (the seed we sow) defines the amount of DDF (what we harvest) returned to the District 3 years hence. DDF is the District's bank account from which Ambassadorial Scholars, Matching Grants, District Simplified Grants and Group Study Exchange are funded for the year. I ask every Rotarian to give what you are able. Be an owner of the magnificent work accomplished by Our Rotary Foundation.

# Assistant Governor Lisa Eimers: Meet My Clubs

As Assistant Governors, we've been invited to submit information about each of our Rotary Clubs; however, here in Columbia, their success working together this year tempts me to write exclusively about their all-club initiatives and successes! I will, however, start by introducing each club first and then move on to describing some notable collaborative efforts.

Columbia Rotary South has been busy this year ramping up its community service initiatives. So far the club has completed noteworthy projects: more than 50 club members participated in a work day at The Food Bank of Central and Northeast Missouri; they have worked hard to install a new sandbox at Field Title I Preschool; and they have undergone an extensive site clean-up and beautification project at Two Mile Prairie Elementary School (over the course of a few weeks). Most impressive is that the club has contributed more than 198 services hours so far this year, with additional projects planned for later this fall. They will again hold a Georgian Wine Tasting and Dinner on Nov. 7, which supports a medical clinic in the Republic of Georgia, a sister city of Columbia's. In addition, they are gearing up for their annual poinsettia fundraiser, so that they can fund local charities.



The Rotary Club of Columbia is celebrating an important milestone in its history: its 90th anniversary this year (2012)! They have "graduated" numerous leaders to the District and national level at various points in history in this long existence.

Their most recent hands-on project was sending two dozen volunteers to the Food

two of them (Past President Darlene Johnson and member Judy Elliott) visited India to participate in a National Immunization Day (NID) for the eradication of polio, a worldwide Rotary goal. In addition, this club has had heavy involvement in planning for the upcoming visit by the GSE Team from Panama. In addition, they received DSG monies to provide support for the publication of copies of the Boone County Senior Directory, which contains a list of services available from the city, county and state offices and agencies to low-income elderly and the disabled.

Columbia Metro Rotary recently held a clean up day at Douglass High School (an alternative high school) and the Park Avenue Preschool, and even had numerous non-Rotarians show up to help with the efforts. The club has long had a partnership with Douglass High School in many supportive ways. In addition, they completed a productive visioning session for the year. As a result, they are working on updating by-laws as well as developing a records retention policy and a political policy that is in line with the directives from Rotary International. They have been actively engaged in their exchange student Dilara's transition as well as the GSE team planning.

Columbia Northwest Rotary has been involved with a establishing a new relationship with West Boulevard Elementary School. Following the District's lead in each club establishing a work day for a local school, they decided to become a Partner in Education with this great school. They have met with the school representatives to begin the relationship and already have sixteen volunteers, one per class, and five alternates. In addition, they are embarking on their popular annual rose sale which, annually, garners close to \$15,000 for their club's foundation. In turn, it benefits local nonprofit groups.

Rotaract is off to a great start this year. This club is the best of Columbia's young professionals in action! They are few but a mighty group of people that love to volunteer in the community and network with other Rotarians in Columbia.

Sunrise Southwest Rotary experienced a Rotary Visioning Session at the start of the Rotary year and has been busy moving forward with the action items generated from that process. They put together a large group of volunteers preparing for and serving at the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure. In addition, they are focused on revising their bylaws to reflect their structure, mission and goals. Sunrise Southwest will again host their traditional all-club Tailgate for Haiti on the weekend of Oct. 6th, prior to the Vanderbilt game; this supports medical supplies for still-ravaged parts of Haiti. New Generations is becoming a solidified focus for this club; they send students each summer to RYLA, sponsor students on outbound Rotary exchanges, and are enjoying their exchange student, Giulia, from Brazil.

The level of cooperation among the 6 clubs is truly blossoming here, and the energy that each of these presidents brings to this year is impressive indeed. The presidents began the new Rotary year by focusing on securing a District Simplified Grant. Their collaborative efforts were rewarded and they received funding to help the Outdoor Sciences and Counseling programs at Douglass High School (an alternative learning school). The project has four distinct although interrelated parts: (i) raising funds to properly equip the Outdoor Sciences program with camping equipment and gardening tools, (ii) joint planning and implementation involving Rotarians, students, and others in the community, of two service projects – installing small and attractive "learning gardens" using native and food plants on the south and west sides of the school, and the design and installation of equipment to create a "fitness trail" along a new walkway on the west and north sides of the school that is being installed this year with funding from the City of Columbia and PedNet; (iii) using Rotary mentors to better connect students to community and careers, and (iv) use of presentations by Rotarians, Rotary magazines and videos, and other RI materials to help the students with work, social efficacy, and other personal management skills.

The clubs have planned an exciting 5-day stay for the GSE Team from Panama, and are looking forward to finally having all of those plans underway and taking place.

In addition, they are almost finished their collaborative efforts on what has become a wonderful tradition in Columbia: the all-club Thanksgiving Luncheon. There will be a silent auction and a vibrant program, followed by a monetary gift to two philanthropic initiatives.

A current and ongoing collaboration between the clubs is organizing film discussion groups across Columbia based upon 'Battle Within', the story of lifetime educator Elliot Battle and his quiet peaceful battle with segregation and racism in our town in the 50's and 60's. This initiative will hopefully inspire dialogue about conflict resolution by peaceful means and leadership skills in our community amongst youth and adults. We had a showing of the film recently, and many in attendance found that this film and the message of Mr Battle's life exemplified our Four Way Test and principals of Rotary.

They are continuing to look for ways to collaborate, and now have their sights set on a possible international project together. It's an exciting time and anything's possible!

# World Polio Day - 24 October

"A tipping point between success and failure," is the phrase used by the Director-General of the World Health Organization about the current state of our efforts to finally eradicate polio. The new Global Emergency Plan is a joint effort of Rotary, the United Nations, and multiple national and private organizations, for a final push. As he has noted, we have now seen the lowest number of cases in four countries, the absence of a single case of polio in India for more than 20 months, and much less than the final 1%! Still, that final surge will be critical. The budget for this effort is \$2.32 billion, most of which has been pledged or given. However, the projected budget gap is still over \$900 million. The good news is that there are good or excellent prospects for \$344 million, the bad news is that we are still short over \$600 million.

The motto of our current campaign is: "every last child." The funding will not only be concentrating on the three remaining endemic countries-Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan, but also in stamping out polio in countries previously polio free, countries in which there has been imported cases from those which are endemic. Additionally, countries like India, are not sitting on their successes. They are continuing to immunize every child not protected.

Polio cases diagnosed to date in 2012 are 145 compared to 400 cases same date in 2011. We really are 'This Close'.

Remember every Rotary member is encouraged to give at least \$20 each year. Let's give that final push! Your \$20 gift will purchase and deliver 33 doses of bivalent polio vaccine; 33 children who will not get polio and 33 children who will not become infected carriers of polio.

### ROTARY DISTRICT 6080 PANAMA PROJECT

#### **REVIEW OF 2011 PROJECT**

Thank you to everyone who participated in the Panama Project in 2011. With the support of the Missouri National Guard and our fellow Rotarians in Panama, we were able to accomplish the following:

- We assembled and provided 300 well-baby kits to new mothers in Panama.
- We shipped 35 PET (Personal Energy Transportation) vehicles to those in need in Panama, with our fellow Rotarians in Panama beginning to distribute them.
- Through donations and RI matching grants, we raised over \$18,000 to support the kits and purchase water purification systems. Fresh drinking water is tremendous need throughout Panama, particularly in the jungle region of the Darian Province.

#### A NEW YEAR, A NEW PROJECT - 2012

The partnership with our fellow Rotarians in Panama is just beginning, along with our collaboration with the Missouri National Guard. Rotarians in Panama have identified other needs in their country, and we hope District 6080 will again answer the call. Here is an overview of the vision for this coming Rotary year.

**Clothing Collection:** We are asking clubs to collect clothing (men's, women's, and children's)

- We are asking you to collect only lightweight clothing due to the climate in Panama.
- No waist sizes larger than 36".
- Clothing should be sorted and boxed by "Men, Women, or Children."
- If used clothing, they should be lightly worn, nice enough for you or your grandchild to wear.
- NO shoes per the request of the Rotarians in Panama.

**Walkers and Crutches:** There is a need for both of these items, especially collapsible walkers.

**Sports Equipment:** There is a need for Frisbees, baseball equipment, soccer equipment, and other sports equipment. This is a great opportunity to check with your local schools for gently used equipment.

**Children's Toys:** This could be an opportunity to initiate a project with your local schools.

**Books and School Supplies:** Improving education and literacy is crucial to these areas. Important to make sure books are in Spanish.

Items can also be brought to the Rotary District Convention in Branson from October 18-20. However, the preference is to have items delivered to Columbia.
