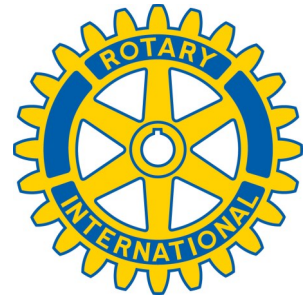

## Week One at the Rotary Peace Center of Chulalongkorn University

What is conflict resolution?



Sometimes I get blue in face of humanity's disregard for life and by the way we tend to cannibalize our own species. Other times, I remember that many people work endless hours towards making a difference and stopping the worse of the human traits from showing their face. People like, Michael Fryer who has worked in peace and conflict resolution from Northern Ireland to Sri-Lanka and Irene Santiago who is the founder of Mindanao Commission of Women and has also been a vice presidential candidate in the Philippines. What an incredible duo these two are! At times as the class, in my first full week as a Peace Fellow at Chulalongkorn's Peace and Conflict Resolution Program, was working at conflict resolution problems you could get a glimpse at the collective working of our brains, you could actually hear the metaphorical wheels turning.

So, it turns out, conflict is, and we have to figure out how to deal with it, no big news here right? Then why is it that we fail constantly and what's worse why is it that we allow it to take the lives of millions? Why not figure out a way to spare the most vulnerable in society from having to starve to death and experience short and brutal lives? According to the WHO one of three women globally are victims of abuse. Why allow this to happen? Well, it is not as easy to stop, especially when it involves more than actually stopping the perpetrator but also the conditions that produce the crime, something we call structural violence. Can you stop violence against women and children in a failed state like Somalia, Congo, lets not kid ourselves Afghanistan, and increasingly Central African Republic? It turns out in the pecking order of conflict resolution society's most vulnerable are lacking in priority. Eliminate the conditions for failed states and you may have a fighting chance but have you ever thought what it would involve? And if you could do it in Afghanistan, where the world's richest countries have spent blood and riches like drunken sailors on R'n'R, would it work for the Congo? Most certainly not and your efforts start all over again. Meanwhile, of course, as violence in certain places rises so does



poverty, for the two are intimately linked, the spiral goes on until our evening news are filled with skeleton like starving babies slowly dying for our viewing pleasure.

As bleak as the picture I have painted is, I believe there's hope, mainly because of the individuals who work to bring peace and who are not satisfied when there is just absence of violence, something called negative peace, but are dedicated to work until positive peace has been achieved and structural violence is absent. A tall order indeed, yet after been here for just about two weeks and witnessing the dedication of the smartest group of individual I know, I believe it is possible. If a man from Bradford can sit in a room surrounded by members of a group designated in many countries as terrorist, some of which have blood in their hands without a doubt, and play the "Grand National," a game involving pretending to be a horse in Liverpool's annual horse race, until everyone is dying with laughter, anything is possible. We just have to try hard enough.

Frankly, at the end of the day, I'm glad I'm here, spending time away from family and friends, dedicating myself to learning about conflict resolution, it is a higher calling. No, I am not about to switch professions, give up my cushioned chair at the department of Government, International Studies and Languages but everyday I hear something new and I imagine myself incorporating it in my future teaching. I play this mental game, what if. I think to myself this simulation with the Bosnian Muslims and Serbs was particularly illuminating might I use this in my world politics course? No matter what I hope I will come out a better person and I will eventually find ways to transfer this knowledge to a few future generations of university students back home, maybe it is the least I can do, but I will do it well.

## Rotary Scholarship Update

Future Vision has produced a number of changes in Rotary educational and humanitarian programs. Some are readily visible, while others may not be readily discerned by the casual observer. Under the new rules, Rotary districts have been given considerable latitude in some areas, but have been saddled with more expectations and more limitations in other areas.

The Rotary scholarship program is no exception to these changes. A good example is the change in the deadline for submitting applications. The new deadline for submitting scholarship applications has been moved from March to October 2013 for applicants who wish to be considered for study abroad during the 2014-15 academic year. The following chart provides a schedule for action:

### Rotary District 6080 Timeline for 2014-15 Academic Year

Clubs and individual Rotarians recruit applicants	July through September 2013
Deadline for submitting applications to local clubs	October 1, 2013
Clubs interview applicants, make a recommendation, and then forward endorsed application to District Scholarship Chair	October 15, 2013
District scholarship committee considers all applications and in-	November 16, 2013
Candidates to be recommended by the District seek admission at	November 17 through January 2014
District submits application(s) of recommended candidates with letter of admission to the study institution to the Rotary Foundation for possible approval	February 2014

The District Scholarship Committee will no longer select applicants for scholarships, but will recommend candidates to the Rotary Foundation for consideration and approval for funding.

Rotarians in District 6080 will be seeking applicants for Global Scholarships for the 2014-15 academic year. Both the level of academic study and the field of study for Global Scholars are narrowly defined. Scholars must have completed a bachelor's degree program and must enroll as a graduate student in a graduate program of study. Their field of study must be directly related to one of the following six areas of focus of humanitarian need:

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development

Rotary International has targeted these areas in order to maximize the impact of Rotarian resources to improve the general welfare of those in need.

Global Scholarships will be funded jointly by District 6080 (\$15,000) and a Global Grant from the World Fund at the Rotary Foundation (\$15,000). The scholarship will total \$30,000, which is intended to cover most, if not all, costs of travel to/from the study site, tuition, fees, books, and educational supplies, as well as room and board for two semesters of study.

## Panama Project Reaches a Milestone

Panama Rotary Project reaches a milestone! On June 22, 2013, 45,000 pounds of supplies arrived in Panama thanks to the generosity of the Rotarians of District 6080 and the partnering with multiple agencies including the Missouri National Guard, the Department of Defense and the Denton program, and the PET folks from Columbia. The 45,000 lbs of supplies included clothing for men, women and children, 35 Personal Energy Transportation (PET) vehicles and 300 water purification systems.

This project began three years ago when then District Governor Rita Esterly directed a group of local Rotarians in Jefferson City to come up with an international project for the 2011 district conference. Esterly and the group chose Panama as its destination. Jim Wieberg, a member of Breakfast Rotary in Jefferson City took charge of the project with Ken Hussey, a member of the Evening club and Mark Naeger of the West club.

A partnership was developed between Rotary District 6080, the Missouri National Guard and Rotary District 4240 which includes the country of Panama. The National Guard was represented by Col. Rebecca Segovia and the District 4240 was represented by Vincente Pascual of the Rotary Club of Panama City, Panama.

The first part of the project involved preparing well baby kits and PET's to ship to Panama in 2011. Maternal health and newborn care was something in desperate need in Panama. The clubs in District 6080 collected enough items to fill 300 well baby kits and the Personal Energy Transportation folks in Columbia MO donated 35 PETs to send to Panama. Nine pallets of kits and PET's were shipped to Panama in December of 2011 through the Navy's program called "Project Handclasp."

The Rotary Club of Panama City then requested water purifications systems similar to those already installed by the MO Guard in Panama. Thanks to the generosity of the Rotarians of District 6080 we were able to collect \$9000.00 for water systems and that was matched by Rotary International for a total of \$17,500. At the District Conference in 2012 District Governor Mark Pearce requested clothing donations for the people of Panama. Five pallets of clothing for men, women and children along with school supplies and medical equipment were collected. Finding transportation was the biggest challenge to getting the supplies moved to Panama.

A year of negotiating, planning and partnering led us to a program sponsored by the Department of Defense, called the Denton Program. Through this program the Air Force "allows private U.S. citizens and organizations to use space available on U.S. military cargo planes to transport humanitarian goods to countries in need." We sent an application on behalf of District 6080 and were accepted by the Denton program as appropriate applicants.

The National Guard paid for the shipment costs for the Water systems to be shipped from the factory in Michigan to Jefferson City, MO where they were stored by Jefferson City Oil company in a local warehouse until shipment to Panama could be arranged. Our shipment was inspected by the Department of Defense on June 9, 2013 and we were asked to have our supplies at Whiteman Air Force Base on June 13<sup>th</sup>, delivered by the National Guard, and on June 14<sup>th</sup> the supplies were moved by the Air Force to Charleston, South Carolina and were shipped to Panama and arrived in Panama on June 22, 2013 as documented in the photos attached. The supplies were met at the airport by Vincente Pascual and members of the Rotary Club of Panama City as well as members of the National Guard stationed in Panama.

The next phase of the project is the dispersal of the clothing and supplies and the installation of the water systems in the Darien Province of Panama. The District plans to send a group of Rotarians to Panama in January of 2014 to help with the installation of the water systems. More will be forthcoming on those plans.



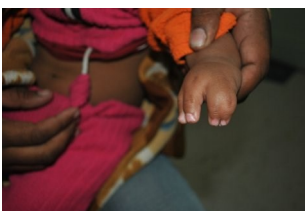

## Columbia Rotary Club Supports Plastic Surgeries in India

The five Rotary clubs of Columbia joined in supporting a Free Plastic Surgery Camp at the Jalna Mission Hospital in Jalna, India earlier this spring. The Rotary Club of Columbia (acting as the lead club), Columbia Northwest Rotary Club, Columbia South Rotary Club, Columbia Metro Rotary Club, Columbia Sunrise Southwest Rotary Club and an anonymous Rotarian from the Rotary Club of Columbia contributed funds to support this project. Local contributions were matched by a Rotary District Grant and by a grant from the Rotary Foundation to provide a total of



\$16,525 for the purchase of medical supplies and services needed for plastic surgeries of 90 patients to correct cleft lips and palates, deformities of hands and feet, and the disfigured bodies resulting from severe burns. The jointly-funded grant initiated by Rotarians in Columbia represented the largest gift to the Jalna plastic surgery project in 2013. The Columbia clubs partnered with the Rotary Club of Jalna, India, the host sponsor club, in this humanitarian effort. Other supporting partner clubs include the Rotary Club of Hattingen, Germany and the Rotary Club of Bombay Midtown.

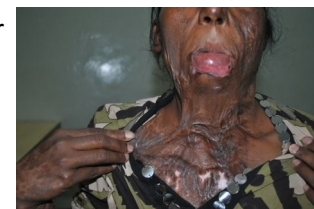


The Free Plastic Surgery Camp was made possible by a team of German plastic surgeons, anesthesiologists, and nurses who travelled to Jalna during their vacation to provide gratis service to the poor who desperately needed medical attention. The German medical team was joined by a large team of surgeons from India to perform surgeries in Jalna between February 23 and March 6, 2013.



The Plastic Surgery Camp was begun in 2004 and celebrated its tenth anniversary this spring. In past years, the plastic surgery camp was held for three weeks, but this year's surgical period was cut short by the illness of the lead German surgeon who was diagnosed with malignant melanoma two days after Christmas. Initially Jalna Rotarians feared that the camp might be cancelled this year, but a cadre of German physicians and nurses who had traveled to Jalna previously insisted that the camp should continue as planned, but with a smaller medical team from Germany and fewer patients.

Because of the success of the Free Plastic Surgery Camp this year, the District Governor of Rotary District 3132 awarded First Prize to the Rotary Club of Jalna for sponsoring the best humanitarian project in the district. The Columbia Rotary clubs are pleased to have been the largest international contributor to that winning project.
