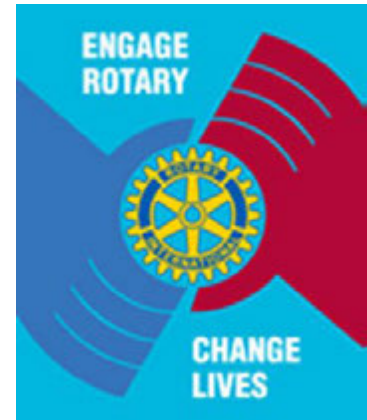

Don't Meth With Us (DMWU): The Perfect Rotary Project

What makes a perfect Rotary project? Well, it definitely would be a project that will “Engage Rotary & Change Lives”, by including at least one of the six areas of focus; Peace & Conflict Resolution, Disease Prevention & Treatment, Water & Sanitation, Maternal & Child Health, Basic Education & Literacy or Economic & Community Development. You could also include the Youth Services (formerly New Generations) in the description of a perfect Rotary project.

With Missouri consistently leading the nation in meth lab seizures, year after year, methamphetamine usage is an epidemic in our state. Thousands and thousands of lives are devastated by the abuse of this drug. The Don't Meth With Us project addresses Missouri's problem by educating 5th graders of the dangers of using meth. The project engages the children with Rotary's mission and it teaches the concepts of good/bad choices and short/long term goals. It also shows how trying meth one time could lead them down a painful path.

The Rotary Club of Springfield Southeast learned about the program started in Farmington, New Mexico at the Rotary International Convention in Montreal. After a quick pilot run at a few schools, Southeast rolled out the program to all 38 public schools and several private schools in Springfield. Not only did the club find the program easy to organize, but people and organizations were eager to donate to help educate children in their community. In addition, the club found working with the 5th grade children was both fun and rewarding. During the presentation, the club provides each student with a DMWU t-shirt, wristband, pencil. They are also provided with a pledge card they sign to attest that they know what to say if someone asks the. To do drugs." "The Rotary 4 Way Test is also on the back of the card.

The second year, we hired a professional speaker to speak to over 7500 high school students and discuss his battle with the demons of methamphetamine addiction. David Parnell provided the high school students with some real world examples of how individuals and family are affected by this destructive drug. Our Springfield Public Schools, as well as the private schools we partner with, have given us tremendous feedback on both programs. Because of their feedback, this past spring, we partnered with the Glendale High School Interact club and provided a Drug Jeopardy game in every 7th grade class. Interactors provided the education and a Rotary member or two attended for support and score keeping. The winning team won a prize, and all students received a Don't Meth With Us wristband in Rotary colors.

Several other clubs throughout District 6080 have started a methamphetamine education program for 5th graders.

Meet My Clubs

Rotary Club of Boonville

The Rotary Club of Boonville is enthusiastically led this year by President Jennifer Waibel and President-elect Jasen Matyas. The club is focused on fun and fellowship and building a community of friends who are living out Rotary's motto: Service above Self.

Many of the club's members have been members for a long time because they truly enjoy the camaraderie with other members and making a difference locally as well as internationally through their service projects. They support local charities that are most in need, which is evaluated regularly, as well as Rotary International causes. For example, the club sponsors "Pedaling for Polio" each year to raise money to help Rotary International defeat polio, which this year will be on September the 14th.

The Boonville club supports RYLA and has a Rotary Education emphasis at their meeting on the last Monday of each month. During this meeting, two local Boonville High School students are invited to be their guests and they sometimes serve as the program for the day. Their best fundraiser is an Annual Trivia Night at the Isle of Capri. Rotarians from other clubs and others are invited to participate in this exciting FUNdraiser, which is usually held in February or March of each year.

This 27-member club, which has several Paul Harris Fellows and is historically the Rotary club that sponsored the founding of the Fayette Rotary Club in 1937, is planning to increase their membership to 32! Boonville Rotary Club meets every Monday at Noon in the Fellowship Hall of the First Christian Church in Boonville. Join them whenever you are in town and looking for a club meeting.

Rotary Club of Centralia

Dr. Lori Brown, president of the Centralia Rotary Club, is most proud of the commitment of her club's members to the numerous activities and service projects that her club sponsors. Many of her fellow Rotarians have been in the club for years and truly enjoy the rich fellowship and the outstanding community service projects they work on together.

I personally visited their annual Anchor Fest food booth on June 2nd in Centralia and ate one of the best rib eye steak sandwiches I've ever had. The club cleared a profit of \$2,800 this year, which was low due to the large amount of rain they had on Friday and Saturday. The largest fundraiser, however, is definitely from their home football concessions sales, which nets the club a profit of anywhere from \$25,000-\$40,000 per year. However, most of the profits go back to the local school to fund various clubs and the junior class prom. Local high school students work with Rotarians to help earn the money for their clubs and the prom. The club also uses some of their profit to fund three \$1,000 college scholarships. Besides the above two fundraisers, the club has an annual pancake breakfast every December.

The Centralia club is working on increasing their membership, especially among professional women in the community. They also are researching the possibility of starting an Interact Club due to the influence of their locally sponsored RYLA student who attended this year's academy, as well as engaging in the Rotary Youth Exchange program, once again, as well as getting involved in a Rotary Literacy Project.

Rotary Club of Fayette

Chuck Thompson, president of the Fayette Rotary Club, is enthusiastic about his club. The Fayette Rotarians are a busy bunch with lots of activities and community service projects. The club sponsors a local Fayette High School Interact Club, sponsors an outgoing RYE student to Switzerland and an incoming RYE student from Columbia, SA, and annually sponsors

a Fayette citywide garage sale, which netted the club over \$600 for the local food pantry this year.

The club is involved in Free Trade Coffee sales to help provide clean water wells in 10 developing nations, and these sales have recently been taken over by the local Interactors. In addition to this, the club applied for and received a District Simplified Matching Grant for \$1,000 to help buy needed baseball equipment and uniforms for the Fayette Babe Ruth organization. The members distribute new dictionaries annually to the third graders of the Fayette Public Schools, and they provide funding for over a dozen or more local charities and projects through Happy Can Dollars.

Fayette celebrated 75 years of Service Above Self in April of 2012 with a gala banquet, which was well planned and attended. Three of the club's members have given service at the district level, including: Nina Furstenau, GSE Team Leader to Italy in 2012, Terry Furstenau, Assistant Governor, Area 3 in 2010-13, and Michael Pope, Assistant Governor, Area 3 in 2013-16. There are more than two dozen Paul Harris Fellows in this club, which has received the Star Club Award the past three years and the Presidential Citation in 2013.

Rotarians in Fayette are focused on increasing Public Awareness of their club through the use of the local paper whose publisher is a member of their club. New signage on the South entrance to Fayette on Highway 5 is also being added. Plans are in progress to increase membership, continue the Visioning process started two years ago, as well as start a new service project, which will focus on designing and building mini-marts for P.E.T. in Columbia, Missouri.

Rotary Club of Fulton

Andre Cook, president of the Fulton Rotary Club, is most proud of his club's G.W. Law Award. This award, named for a distinguished former elected Sheriff of Callaway County who died in the line of duty, is given annually to a law enforcement officer who most exemplifies Rotary's motto of Service Above Self. The club is energetically planning this event for this fall and is expecting around 80 members and guests.

The Fulton Rotarians will be working with the Spirit Riders' program this year, which is partially funded through their recent District Simplified Matching Grant and will be used to supply riding equipment for the programs kids, many of whom are at-risk youth. Besides this program, the Fulton club will continue to fund the following programs: Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, YMCA, Chamber of Commerce and Serve, Score against Hunger, Fulton Colleges Fund, and the Churchill Memorial.

This club provides eight \$1,000 college scholarships to local high school students to attend the college of their choice as well as providing the Nolen Courtesy Award to elementary school students, and sending local high school students to Boys State, Girls State, and RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Academy). In fact, I attended their club meeting on Wednesday, August 28th, and experience an enthusiastic presentation on RYLA by this year's sponsored recipients—two beautiful, intelligent and talented twin girls.

The club's best fundraiser again this year is the 3rd Annual Chili Cook Off on September 21st. The club is seeking to increase its membership and to expand its service impact, both locally and globally. On the international level, Fulton Rotary Club works with the Rwanda Community Partnership. They have helped to build new medical clinics there, and they provide assistance in establishing microloans to help people with self-sustaining projects.

Mike Beahon, a Past President of their club, will be the District Governor in 2014-15, and the club is excited about supporting his year of leadership in our district, which promises to be an outstanding year in every respect.

It is week eleven at the Rotary Peace Center of Chulalongkorn University and the Rotary Peace Fellows have just returned from an unbelievable trip to Cambodia. I have not had time to digest all the things I have learned and witnessed in Cambodia but I still have to write my blog. I started one version but it was way too personal, I thought, so I scrapped it. The second version was all theory and very few relatable events from the trip, so out it went. And the third version was not just right, probably because I have no relation to Goldilocks but also because there was nothing magically sweet about Cambodia. It turns out Cambodia is the equivalent of a country of orphans suffering from PTSD trying to inch its way forward without the help of its own leadership. To use another children's story analogy imagine you live in the world of Cinderella only there is no Ball, no Fairy Godmother, and especially no Prince.

Cambodia is shocking even to the seasoned traveler for its underdevelopment, its awful government, and its history. It is a country, which almost makes you give up hope. With an average income of 2,361 dollars Cambodia is one of the poorest countries in the world. Considering that the average GDP per capita includes the very rich and those taking advantage of pockets of wealth in the country the majority of the population lives on a dollar a day which for a westerner can be baffling. The craziest part of the story is that its capital city, Phnom Penh, is a rather expensive place to live, mostly because of the concentration of NGO's and other organizations attempting to engage in the reconstruction of the country and, in the process, making things worse for the locals. We at the Rotary Peace Center have talked ad nauseum of the impact of NGO's in post conflict countries attempting reconstruction and not all the stories are good. In Cambodia the case of the proverbial "the road to hell is paved with good intentions" may actually hold true with all these westerners tripping over each other spending money on programs that may or may not actually help in the end. One thing is for sure, a certain governing elite has become tremendously wealthy over the years through the kindness of strangers, so to speak. So, if the aim was, for all these people to help the country recover from an awful past, it may have backfired.

Governance is an issue in many countries but it is especially an issue in Cambodia. I say governance and not government because pretty much all levels of the administration, the institutional structure, as well as the legal framework need retooling in this country. Unfortunately though, the country is ruled by a vicious nihilistic elite, which understands nothing of democratic rule, good governance or the rule of law. The most popular car in Phnom Penh is the Lexus SUV and is driven usually by people connected and patronized by a government in charge of the country ever since the collapse of the genocidal regime of the Khmer Rouge in 1979. Meanwhile, Cambodia's children are starving and are sold to Asian and Western pedophiles steadfastly lounging around in broad view in Monivong street hotels. The Rotary Peace Fellows got to Cambodia a week after the national elections, which were quiet possibly stolen by the ruling party. As we went about our visits we noticed the ink on the first finger to the right hand on all Cambodians, which meant they had voted in the recent elections, and we engaged in conversations about them. Surprisingly, even though we were told that Cambodians might avoid discussing these issues because of the past and present fear of the government, many of the young people were not only willing but also very critical of the government. It seems the generation thirty years after the Khmer Rouge has had enough with their politicians and is ready to bring about change. I only wish them luck and hope that the transition to multiparty rule is bloodless and effective, I do, however, have my doubts, mainly because of the nature and the history behind those who rule the country, which brings me to the historical roots of the present system

While the Vietnam War raged on in former French Indochina the Cambodians, led by the late Prince Sihanouk, attempted a nonaligned strategy thinking, probably correctly, that after the Americans leave their neighbors are still going to be around. With US help Prince Sihanouk was overthrown by his military led by Lon Nol and the country entered a period of civil war. In addition, the US in an attempt to cut off the so-

called Ho Chi Minh Trail and put pressure on the Vietnamese, dropped more bombs on eastern Cambodia than all of Europe during WWII, thus driving the country to the arms of the opposition, the Khmer Rouge, led by a little known man named Pol Pot. By 1975 the apparent failure of US foreign policy was reality and Cambodia became ruled by the Khmer Rouge, a band of brigands with unrivalled cruelty and lack of compassion, whose main objective was to create a truly unique agrarian society. By 1979 when the Khmer Rouge were driven from government by a Vietnamese invasion, to a long protracted civil war, more than two million Cambodian had died from disease, starvation, and murder while most of the country's capacity to rebuilt was erased by the policy of murdering anyone who had been tainted by education. With an entire generation killed of, approximately 25% of the country perished those years, the government propped up by the Vietnamese forces until elections were held in 1993 the new political culture of the country is unfortunately completely nihilistic. Everyone is in search of power and distrustful of his fellow countrymen as well as the government. How can anyone build a future like this? I asked the question to this new generation of activists in our visits in Phnom Penh and I received a variety of answers. The most optimistic was that civil society is starting to work well again and it is a matter of time before the government will follow along. The most pessimistic was that the government is mainly run by old timers which has split from the Khmer Rouge and dominated with the help of the Vietnamese, does not understand anything but raw power, they are after all the by product of the Khmer Rouge machine and thus the country is heading for some turbulent times, as evidenced by military units moving in from the countryside to the capital a week after the election.

For my part, after I visited the Killing Fields, S-21, the infamous prison were about twenty thousand people were tortured and murdered, and the Extraordinary Chambers in the Courts of Cambodia trying some of the Khmer Rouge Leadership for genocide and crimes against humanity, I believe there's a glimmer of hope but it will take time. I just hope the international community will not again forsake Cambodia as it did in the past and it will stand with her in her time of need.

New polio cases reported this past week: 11

Total number of cases in 2012: 223

General Polio Headlines—28 August 2013

The outbreak of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) in the Horn of Africa, which affects Somalia, Kenya and Ethiopia, has spread into two new states of Somalia.

In Israel, the number of sewage samples which have tested positive for WPV1 has reached 85; one sewage sample collected in West Bank and Gaza has tested positive for WPV1.

Endemic Country Headlines—Week Ending 28 August 2013

Afghanistan: No new WPV case were reported in the past week. No new circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) cases were reported in the past week. The total number of cVDPV2 cases in 2013 remains three. The most recent cVDPV2 case had onset of paralysis on 13 March (from Kandahar, Southern Region).

Subnational immunization days (SNIDs) were held on 1-3 July, with resources focusing on strengthening campaign quality in Southern and Eastern Regions.

Nigeria: No new WPV case were reported in the past week. The total number of cVDPV2 cases for 2013 remains one (with onset of paralysis on 6 June, from Borno).

The next subnational Immunization Plus Days (IPDs) are planned across northern states in September.

Pakistan: One new case of WPV was reported in the past week, a WPV1 from FR Bannu in the Federally Administered Tribal Areas, with onset of paralysis on 27 July. This is the most recent case in the country and brings the total number of WPV1 cases for 2013 to 25.

Horn of Africa: (Non-endemic) 20 new WPV1 cases were reported in the past week in Somalia and one in Kenya. The total number of WPV1 cases for 2013 is 142 (128 from Somalia, 13 from Kenya, 1 from Ethiopia). The most recent WPV1 case in the region had onset of paralysis on 30 July (from Somalia).

The outbreak is spreading geographically in Somalia, with two new states reporting cases: Galgaduud and Gedo. Anticipation of this spread has driven intense vaccination activities across the country, in an effort to raise immunity.
