Interview with District Governor-Elect Mike Beahon of Fulton, Mo.



Mike Beahon, past president of the Fulton Rotary Club, has been appointed to become governor of Rotary District 6080 in 2014-15. He currently serves as district governorelect.

Hometown: Rochester, N.Y.; currently living in Fulton, Mo.

Education: St. John Fisher College and Rochester Business Institute, both in Rochester, N.Y.

Family: Wife Mary Ann, who is an active Rotarian and Paul Harris Fellow; she is director of university relations at William Woods University. Daughter Kelly Keller, who is a manager at Starbucks in Columbia and has two daughters, Brooklyn, 4, and Lillian, 10 months. Our son-in-law, Kris Keller, owns Mid-Mow Outdoor Management.

Health: I know there have been some concerns about my ability to serve as District Governor-Elect because I suffer from kidney failure. Let me put those concerns to rest by saying I am currently on peritoneal dialysis, which does not affect my travel since I do it at night while sleeping. In February, I hope to receive a new kidney graciously donated by my daughter.

Why are you involved with Rotary?

I've always enjoyed working with people, and Rotary gives me the opportunity to provide service to people and communities around the world.

What honors and awards have you received in Rotary?

I was president of the Fulton Rotary Club during 2010-11 and received the Service Above Self Award from District Governor Raymond Plue. In addition, the Fulton Rotary Club received three awards that year:

- Membership Development and Extension Award for bringing in the most new members (28 new and plus 15) in District 6080
- Membership Development and Extension Award for achieving the highest growth rate (25 percent) in District 6080 and
- Presidential Citation with Distinction for demonstrating Rotary's commitment to fellowship and service.

What previous experience do you have with civic and service organizations?

I joined the Jaycees in Columbia, Mo., in 1972 before moving to Kansas, where I served as local president, regional director, state president and national vice president. I joined the staff of Jaycees (Junior Chamber) International in Coral Gables, Fla., in 1980 and served as area director for Europe, Africa and the Middle East. I traveled to 55 countries on behalf of the organization, responsible for membership recruitment and development. I later was recruited by a past president of Junior Chamber International to serve as managing director of the 600-employee Africana Breweries in Ibadan, Nigeria.

What brought you to Missouri?

Mary Ann is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism. We met in Rochester, N.Y., where she was a newspaper reporter, and moved to Missouri in 1971. We both worked at MU for four years before moving to Kansas and then Miami, Fla. After 21 years away, we returned to Missouri in 1995 and settled in Fulton, where we purchased Sir Winston's Restaurant & Pub. I am now retired.

What challenges do you face as a District Governor?

To motivate and guide the Rotary clubs to conduct community service at the local level and to get involved at the district and international levels. To elevate support for the Rotary International Foundation. To continue to promote Rotary International's efforts to eradicate Polio worldwide. To make Rotary more accessible to young professionals. To increase attendance at District Conferences by making them more affordable.

What does success look like to you?

As Ray Kroc, the founder of McDonalds, said, "If you work just for money, you'll never make it, but if you love what you're doing and you always put people first, success will be yours."
