District 6080's gift to the hungry

The Rotary clubs of Columbia and mid-Missouri teamed up June 27 to reduce hunger and malnutrition. The clubs participated in a major work day at the Food Bank of Central and Northeast Missouri. Even the entire Dulle family (below) showed up to help from Chicago, Pittsburg and San Antonio.

Although the clubs often conduct food drives and provide volunteer labor throughout the year, this was their first combined work day at the food bank. Club members, their families and friends worked in shifts from 9 to 10:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. to noon. Approximately 150 Rotarians and guests repackaged nearly 5,000 pounds of Rice Krispies for local food pantries.

"Missouri ranks second from the bottom of all states for food insecurity," Steve Dulle, new district governor of Rotary District 6080, said.

"That's why we chose this as our first community service project of the new Rotary year."
He added, "Rotary has six areas of focus, including 'saving mothers and children.' At least 7 million children under the age of 5 die each year due to malnutrition, poor health care and inadequate sanitation. We want to do our part to prevent this from happening."



Camdenton Rotary Club member honored for 70 years of perfect attendance

When Grant Richards and his family moved to Camdenton in 1937, his father, G.T. Richards who had just purchased the Lake Sun, and a dentist friend, decided to create a club for local business owners to gather and discuss their ventures and enjoy dinner. It wasn't called the Camdenton Rotary Club back then, but the ideals

and goals have remained the same over the years, despite the growth of the community and the club itself. For 64 years, G.T. Richards attended Rotary club meetings without ever missing a single one. That dedication is something his son would take note of as he started his own streak in June, 1945, after returning from the Navy. His last tour was in Iwo Jima, Japan in 1945.

"It's kind of to honor my dad because he never missed a meeting in 64 years till he died," Richards said. "I was always kiddin' with him and said 'well I'm younger I'll beat you." On Wednesday, the Camdenton Rotary Club and President Mark House honored Richards (pictured with his daughter above) with a memorial plaque for his 70 years of consistent dedication during their weekly meeting at the Golden Rock Winery. Through rain and shine, Richards has attended every Camdenton Rotary Club meeting since he was accepted in 1945. He still drives himself to the weekly meetings, though it takes him a few more minutes to get around these days. He has no plans to stop.
