ROTARY SCHOLAR SHARES HIS EXPERIENCES WITH THE PULASKI COUNTY ROTARY CLUB

On April 5, Cpt. Bryan Lee shared his experiences in Singapore as one of Rotary International's Ambassadorial Scholars with the Rotary Club of Pulaski County. In 2009 Lee, a San Francisco native and West Point graduate, was commissioned as an Aviation officer and was named a Rotary international scholar. He spent two years in Singapore working for the State Department's Office of Defense Cooperation based out of the U.S. Embassy, while pursuing a master's degree in international studies at Nanyang Technological University's Rajaratnam School of International Studies. A Black Hawk pilot, Lee deployed to Afghanistan in 2013 and to Liberia in 2014. He recently completed the Engineer Captain's Career Course at Fort Leonard Wood and will move with his family to Hawaii in July, where he will serve with the 25th Combat Aviation Brigade at Wheeler Army Airfield. FULTON ROTARY COMPLETES SERVICE PROJECT FOR CARDV

The Rotary Club of Fulton put the finishing touches on its yearlong service project for the Coalition Against Rape and Domestic Violence (CARDV) this week, mulching around the new playset purchased by the club and staining a new gate.

The Rotary club contributed \$3,600 raised during the 2015 Callaway Cup Mouse Races toward helping CARDV and these funds were matched by Rotary District 6080, resulting in a \$7,200 contribution toward purchases for the domestic violence organization.

The donation allowed Rotary to furnish two "advocacy" rooms, where victims of domestic violence meet with an advocate, identify needs, develop individualized actions to meet those needs, and create a safety plan; completed improvements to the backyard playground (purchased new equipment), patio, and fencing, creating a safer place for children to play outside while their parents are meeting with an advocate, counselor, and/or in a support group environment.

Rotary had partners who helped with the project. The men's basketball team from William Woods University and the youth group from Heartland Nazarene Church helped stain and repair the fence, stain the side porch, install the locking gate, and haul the old play equipment and other miscellaneous items to the curb for trash pick-up. The new Rotaract club at William Woods stained the new gate.

ELIZABETH J. UPTON FUNDRAISER

Elizabeth J Upton was a Rotary Exchange student to Lyon, France in 2013/2014. Her life ended tragically in 2014 in a car accident after her return to Columbia, Missouri. Her mother, Marilyn Upton, a member of the Columbia Northwest Rotary Club, asked that those wanting to contribute funds at the funeral direct these funds to the District 6080 Rotary Youth Exchange for scholarships of our exchange students not able to afford this program. Over \$11,000 was contributed from generous donors at that time. Now, Marilyn has established the Elizabeth J Upton Foundation with the same purpose in mind. The foundation is holding a fundraiser on May 22 from 10a.m. to 2 p.m. at Hoss's Market at 1010 Club Village Drive in Columbia. And as for home, I know now that it hasn't just one name."

Rotary District 6080 held a Million Dollar Dinner April 23 at the Holiday Inn Executive Center, in honor of the late Mike Beahon, past district governor. Leading up to the dinner, more than \$2 million was raised, which will help fund Rotary's final efforts to eradicate polio, a disease that once paralyzed more than 1,000 children worldwide every day. More than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries have been immunized and only two endemic countries remain. So far this year, only nine polio cases have been reported in the entire world. Raymond Plue, past district governor and current Rotary Foundation chair, organized the event and Ray Klinginsmith, past president of Rotary International and current chair of The Rotary Foundation, was the speaker. The Rotary Foundation is a not-forprofit corporation that supports the efforts of Rotary International to achieve world understanding and peace through international humanitarian, educational and cultural exchange programs.
