Ravindran moves audience with personal story

RI President K.R. Ravindran closed the convention with a poignant story about his mother's fight to survive polio at age 30.

When Ravindran was 11 years old in his native Sri Lanka, his mother awoke one day feeling weak and short of breath. Sitting down to rest, she found herself unable to move. The polio virus had quickly invaded her nervous system, resulting in paralysis.

She was placed in an iron lung at the hospital to enable her to breathe, and was told that her chances of walking, or even surviving without a ventilator, were slim. But most Sri Lankan hospitals were not equipped with ventilators in 1963.

Ravindran's grandfather, a Rotary member, hosted a club committee meeting in his living room the evening after his daughter was rushed to the hospital. Rather than simply offer consolation, his fellow members went to work, using their business acumen and professional connections to find a ventilator.

One of the members was a bank manager who called a government minister to facilitate a quick international transfer of funds. Another member, a manager at SwissAir, arranged to have a ventilator flown in. The next day, it arrived at the hospital.

"There was so much red tape at the time in Sri Lanka, but somehow, those Rotarians made it all fall away," Ravindran told the packed audience at the KINTEX Convention Center in Goyang city. Ravindran's mother spent a year-and-a-half in a hospital bed, but her condition gradually improved. She eventually left the hospital walking -- with a walker, but upright, on her own two feet.

"Fifty-three years ago, my mother's life was perhaps one of the very first to be saved from polio by Rotarians," Ravindran said. "We have saved millions of lives since then.

"Tonight, I stand before you as her son, and your president, to say that soon -- perhaps not in years but in months -- Rotary will give a gift that will endure forever: a world without polio."

At the convention's general session the day before, Rebecca Martin, director of the Center for Global Health at the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, had described how close we are to polio eradication. Earlier that day, Rotary released an additional \$35 million in grants to support global efforts to end the crippling disease.

This year's convention, one of the largest in Rotary history, attracted more than 43,000 attendees from over 150 countries. Ravindran, in his final speech to members as their president, emphasized what it really means to be a Rotarian.

"There are people on this planet whose lives are better now because you traversed this earth," he said. "And it doesn't matter if they know that or not. It doesn't matter if they even know your name or not. What really matters is that your work touched lives; that it left people healthier, happier, better than they were before."

COLUMBIA METRO ROTARY GIVES THE GIFT OF ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Columbia Metro Rotary, in partnership with Central Missouri Community Action's (CMCA) Weatherization Assistance Program and the City of Columbia Energy Challenge, has distributed energy-efficient LED light bulbs, along with educational materials on no and low-cost ways to save energy in the home, to 20 income qualifying families this year. In addition, the program currently expanded to assist families that apply to CMCA's Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and 18 more families will receive lights and education packets by the end of Metro Rotary's fiscal year.

Metro Rotary's commitment to improve the lives of children and families in Columbia inspired the donation of 200 ENERGY STAR rated LED light bulbs to CMCA's Weatherization Program. Metro Rotary volunteers also partnered with the City of Columbia to provide energy efficiency education to children who are just now learning about the connection between energy efficiency, economic savings and ecological stewardship at Columbia's Sustainable Living Fair in October.

NOTE FROM FOUNDATION CHAIR RAYMOND PLUE

As there is no foundation newsletter this month, Raymond Plue asked that the following be included in this newsletter:

I write encouraging you to be a participant this year in the success of Rotary's Foundation programs. Every Rotarian is encouraged to hold ownership and contribute to The Rotary Foundation every year. Your generous gift will be returned to our district and your/our Rotary clubs 3 years hence. Gifts given 3 years ago enabled 25 of our Rotary clubs this year to conduct local community service projects with a total value to their communities of \$107,440. Our district's Rotary clubs also conducted Global Grants saving the lives of the newborn in Georgia, bringing water to an orphanage in Sierra Leon, safe drinking water to Honduras, Panama and Kenya, and kidney transplants to the poor in Mexico. Our gifts to PolioPlus have enabled the world to expect to see the last case of polio this calendar year. Rotary became involved when polio infected more than 1,000 young children every day; the world now sees less than one case of polio during a week and that in only two countries. The polio virus will be eradicated during 2016. Your gift, no matter the amount will bring a magnificent change to someone you may meet in your community or may never meet in their faraway land. Their gratitude for your generosity will not be diminished by distance. If possible, please make a contribution to your Rotary foundation before June 30.

2016 COUNCIL GRANTS CLUBS GREATER FLEXIBILITY

In April 2016 the Council on Legislation representatives from Rotary districts around the world met in Chicago to revise Rotary policies. They approved changes that give clubs greater flexibility in when, where, and how they meet and the types of membership they offer. The changes take effect July 1, 2016.

While the enactments adopted by the 2016 Council increase clubs' flexibility in meetings and membership categories, they don't permit clubs to deviate from Rotary's essential elements:

- We are still business, professional, and community leaders. Our qualifications for membership have not changed.
- The Object of Rotary, our basic tenets, have not changed.
- Our essence statement join leaders, exchange ideas, and take action have not changed.

- Our values of fellowship, integrity, diversity, service, and leadership have not changed.
- The Four-Way Test, one of our most important distinguishing features, has not changed.

Clubs that wish to continue to follow their traditional requirements for meetings, attendance, structure, and categories of membership are encouraged to do so. Also, Rotary clubs will now be able to adopt the new options the Council on Legislation approved by amending their bylaws.

Flexibility in meeting frequency, format, and attendance

Council on Legislation representatives voted to eliminate limitations on how Rotary clubs conduct their meetings. It is agree that individual clubs should be able to:

- Determine the best day and time for their meetings
- · Change or cancel a meeting, if the need arises
- · Count service projects or social events as meetings
- Choose whether to gather in person, meet online, alternate between online and in-person meetings, or even use both formats at the same time (for example, a member could participate in an in-person meeting online through video chat)
- Amend their bylaws to either relax or tighten attendance requirements and policies of terminating members for poor attendance

Rotary clubs now have the option of reducing their meeting frequency as long as they meet in some way at least twice per month.

Flexibility in membership types

The RI Bylaws and Standard Rotary Club Constitution provide for two types of membership: active and honorary. By amending their bylaws, clubs may offer additional membership types that are desired in the community, such as associate, corporate, family membership or others.

- Rotary International will continue to record, and grant all of the benefits of membership to, active members only who pay RI dues
- Clubs that offer additional membership categories should report these members to Rotary International as active and are responsible for paying said members' RI dues
- Clubs and districts set their own policies about these members' other financial obligations (club and district dues, meal costs, etc.), attendance requirements, and service expectations and reflect these policies in their bylaws
- Clubs determine how they accept former or transferring members, including whether they allow current Rotaractors to join

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Dual membership for rotaractors

The Council amended the Rotary International Bylaws to permit Rotaractors who meet the qualifications of membership to join a Rotary club while remaining Rotaract members.
