World Polio Day October 24

Paralytic polio cases for 2017 are 11 compared to 25 on the same date in 2016. Pakistan has five cases, the last reported Aug. 21, while Afghanistan has six cases, the last reported July 10. Both countries continue to have the poliomyelitis virus isolated from environmental samples. Persistent vigilance is ever more important now as we struggle mightily on this last mile. The coming season of drier, colder weather results in reduced pools where the polio virus may reside. Vaccination rounds have been increased thereby reducing the number of 'silent carriers' shedding virus into the environment. For every one polio paralytic victim there are 99 polio infected, yet healthy appearing individuals shedding virus in every stool passage.

These values were generated when a Rotarian telephoned asking how their Rotary club stood with the number of Paul Harris Fellows and how their club compared to others.

The front page of the Foundation newsletter lists seven Rotary clubs as 100 percent Paul Harris Fellow clubs. That distinction is earned at the moment in time when every current member is a Paul Harris Fellow and the District Governor reports such for confirmation by Rotary International. That distinction is never taken away just because a new member joins. The record above shows that the Rotary club of Branson Daybreakers is to be lauded for today having 100 percent of their members recognized as Paul Harris Fellows.

It is also notable that 32 of our 50 Rotary clubs have at least 50 percent of their members as Paul Harris Fellows.

One becomes a Paul Harris Fellow by contributing or having another contribute in their name \$1,000 to either the Annual Fund or to PolioPlus.
