# Rotary wins Best Nonprofit Act for its polio eradication work

Rotary's commitment to eradicating polio worldwide won Best Nonprofit Act in the **Hero Awards** of the One Billion Acts of Peace campaign, an international global citizens' movement to tackle the worlds' most important issues.

The campaign is an initiative of PeaceJam Foundation and is led by 14 Nobel Peace Prize laureates, including the Dalai Lama, Desmond Tutu and Rigoberta Menchu Tum, with the ambitious goal of inspiring a billion acts of peace by 2020.

Each year, the campaign picks two finalists in each of six categories for their work to make a measurable impact in one of the 10 areas considered most important by the Nobel laureates. Winners are chosen by people from around the world.

Rotary and Mercy Corps were the two finalists in the Best Nonprofit Act category. Rotary and the five other winners will be recognized at a ceremony on June in Monaco. Betty Williams, who won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1977 for her advocacy for peace in Northern Ireland, will present the award.




### **Rotary Peace Centers**

The Rotary Foundation has awarded District 6080 the title Peace Builder District.

District 6080 is one of 26 districts in Rotary Zone 30/31. The Zone has established an endowment to award a Peace Fellow to study for two years at one of the seven Peace Centers. In addition a shortterm, three-month certificate course in Peace and Conflict Studies was established at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok. Peace Fellow Akis Kalaitzidis, a Warrensburg Rotarian at the University of Central Missouri, studied there in 2013.

Of the 26 districts in Zone 30/31, District 6080 is the second largest contributor to the Zone endowment, with gifts of \$60,000 DDF.

It does not cost the district anything to forward a Peace Fellow. Costs are supported by Foundation Endowments. The district committee did, this past month, interview an outstanding applicant from Tunisia. You are encouraged to identify a worthy candidate and help with the application.

## Polio Support

District 6080 has continually supported polio eradication with contributions of at least 20 percent of each year's DDF allocation.

Below is listed the DDF amount given:

For the past several years, every DDF dollar has been matched with 50 cents from the World Fund. That total has then been matched 2:1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

#### **District Simplified Grants**

Under the old Matching Grants program, districts were allowed only 20 percent of available DDF to be returned to clubs for use in District Simplified Grants. After July 1, 2013, districts could use as much as 50 percent of available DDF for District Simplified Grants. Under the old Matching Grants program, District 6080 generally had about \$25,000 to return to clubs in \$1,000 amounts.

Following is a listing of clubs receiving District Simplified Grants, the total DDF available to clubs and the amount range given to a club. Awards were in direct relation to the club's support of the Annual Fund three years prior. Amounts were matched 1:1 with club cash.
