





Columbia Rotary fries up successful fundraiser

Pulling off a fundraiser in the middle of a pandemic requires a lot of planning, organization and virus-prevention measures. The Rotary Club of Columbia, AKA the Downtown Club, was not only successful in this endeavor, but almost doubled the size of the fundraiser!

During its second year of frying turkeys on Thanksgiving morning, the number of turkeys ordered, fried and delivered increased form 120 last year to 232 this year.

devoted to feeding the needy on Thanksgiving Day. It seems the public really liked the convenience of ordering a turkey (80 percent of sales were online), having it cooked and driving

through a contactless delivery point!

Over 40 Rotarians, including members of the club's sponsored Rotaract

and Interact Clubs, worked on Wednesday and Thursday (starting at 4 a.m.) to complete the project without any major hitches.

Although it was difficult to recognize members with their masks, face shields, hairnets and gloves in place, all members reported great satisfaction with the camaraderie during this important fundraiser.

Final accounting has not been completed, but it is anticipated that the club will more than double last year's profits of over \$3,000. Monies raised will be used for service projects and match money for Rotary grants.

In addition to fundraising, the project produced intangible benefits as well. Most notably, the event promoted Rotary in mid-Missouri by earning numerous print and televised media coverage on both days of the event. Neil Carr, the club's immediate past president, co-chair of the fundraising committee and founder of the Turkey Fry, encouraged everyone to keep an eye out for a likely spring Grab 'n Go shrimp boil!

Rotary club sponsors hurricane relief volunteers

After a devastating season of hurricanes, Lake Charles, Louisiana, is still reeling in the aftermath of damage that blew in with the storms.

Partnering with the Springfield chapter of the American Red Cross, the Rotary Club of Springfield Sunrise sponsored two Red Cross volunteers (a total of \$3,500) to train with the Red Cross and spend 12 days in Lake Charles assisting with hurricane relief efforts.

"Over 90 percent of the Red Cross workforce are volunteers," Stacy Burks, executive director of the American Red Cross of Southern Missouri, said. "The gifts of time and talent that these individuals donate are essential to carrying out the mission of the American Red Cross. Thanks to the Sunrise Rotary Club's generous support,

each of you are, in a way, able to serve alongside our volunteers answering the call in disaster-stricken communities."

Springfield Sunrise Rotary Club President Becky Hosp commented, "This year's theme for Rotary is 'Rotary Opens Opportunities' and Sunrise Rotary is excited this door was opened for us to sponsor these volunteers to go to the St. Charles, Louisiana, area and assist in the hurricane relief efforts needed there," said. "Our motto is 'Service above Self' and we strive to help in making an impact not only in our community but in the lives of those who need it most."

A program idea: exchange info with another club
