

AWARDS AND CRITERIA FOR NOMINATION:

Champion of Increasing Our Impact

A member or club that championed an impactful service project based on a community need, may have leveraged funds through a grant, and shared success with the community.

Champion of Expanding Our Reach

A member or club that reached out to grow Rotary, such as; attracted new members with diverse backgrounds and interests, formed a partnership with a new group in service, led development of new Club (planned charter by June 30), or built an awareness of what Rotary does and Rotary's impact to the community.

Champion of Enhancing Participant Engagement

A member or club that created a new experience that members want to be involved in, provided opportunities for leadership development, and/or demonstrated activities that cared for or supported to members who were isolated due to illness or effects of the pandemic.

Champion of Leading Change Award

A member or club that leads change in how we see Rotary, how we speak about Rotary, what we hear about Rotary, such as, having discussions and using that information to shape strategies/goals and finding meaningful ways to Grow Rotary.

Champion of Peacebuilding

A Peacebuilder or Peacebuilder Club (recognized by the Rotary Action Group For Peace); that builds peace through service within the community, educates Rotary's role in Peace, and knows and seeks to apply the 4-way test throughout their work.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR AWARDS FOR 2020-2021

The following *District Governor Awards* will be presented at a 2021 Fall District Event in addition to the established *Rotary International* (RI) & *The Rotary Foundation* (TRF) Awards. All awards are based on an assessment ending June 30, 2021.

"Club of the Year in Growing Rotary" for the highest net growth in Membership.

"Club of the Future" to the club with the highest number of members under or equal to 40 years of age.

"New Club of the Year" for the club with the highest net growth of members since the charter date (Clubs chartered after July 1, 2018).

"New Satellite Club of the Year" for the club with the highest net growth of members since their charter date (Satellite clubs identified after July 1, 2018).

"Outstanding Club Leader in Growing Rotary" to every club president with net growth +3.

"Club of the Year in Volunteer Service" for the highest number Volunteers and Service hours logged into Rotary Club Central, per capita assessment.

"Club of the Year in Growing Rotary" to the club that had the highest net gain in members.

"Club of the Year in Engagement" to the club that had the highest average attendance.

"Club of the Year in Foundation Giving" for the club that had highest overall (annual, polio plus, and endowments/other) Foundation giving per capita.

"Club of the Year in Foundation Giving and Membership Growth" for the highest overall (annual, polio plus, and endowments/other) Foundation giving per capita while achieving a +3 Net growth or more in Membership.

"Paul Harris Society Governor's Award" for the Club that had the highest net gain in the number of PHS members (2020-2021).

"Outstanding Club Leader in Growing Rotary" to Club presidents with net growth of +3.

"Outstanding Club Leader in Foundation Giving" to Club Presidents that achieved \$125 per capita.

Outstanding President of the Year" to the Club President with the highest net growth of members and at or over \$125/capita in Annual Fund Giving on June 30, 2021.

"Outstanding Leader in Innovation" to team leader(s) that chartered a new club/Satellite.

"Outstanding Rotary Program" to the district program that adapted and led change.



Why you should care about Rotary branding



As a Rotary brand specialist, I see Rotary signs everywhere. I guess you could say it's an occupational hazard. Even my children spot Rotary signs wherever we go. So when I attended a local Rotary event in my hometown last year, I couldn't help but notice how Rotary's logo was being used. At first, I was thrilled to see the club's logo featured on a banner welcoming attendees. But then, I spotted another banner featuring the Rotary wheel as a pancake. Inside the tent, the club hung up a huge banner displaying the old, retired Rotary wheel. Club members who greeted us were all wearing polo shirts with the old wheel on them, but they were handing out brochures that included their newer club logo. Here were five different opportunities to promote the club, and each used different Rotary logos. It was bewildering.

So what? When a club logo isn't used properly, it can create confusion and mistrust. In 2012, Coca-Cola temporarily replaced the iconic red can with white cans that featured polar bears on it for the holidays. But they had to pull them from shelves when retailers and customers reported being confused. The cans looked too much like Diet Coke cans, and that's not what consumers wanted. This is one example of what happens when a logo is altered. By just changing the can color, the public was frustrated. They didn't trust the product anymore. And that impacts the brand.

Now imagine that each Rotary, Rotaract, and Interact club had its own logo. How would the public know which Rotary club to trust, to join, or to donate money to?

When a club alters the Rotary logo – like turning the Rotary wheel into a pancake, changing the fonts, or adding additional colors – it weakens our global brand. That can impact our ability to attract future members, earn the trust of donors, encourage volunteers to help on our service projects, and even secure partnership opportunities. Old branding tells the public that this club is outdated. Inconsistent branding sends mixed messages of who we are. Studies show that consistent logo use builds organizational trust and awareness. Isn't that something we all want for Rotary — to be a trusted organization in our communities?

Over the next year, we are going to talk a lot more about branding and how to use Rotary's logos properly. We are working with you to build a strong Rotary because a strong Rotary – one that is recognizable, trusted, and united – has a much greater chance of attracting members, donors, volunteers, and partners. Our regional and district leaders will join us in sharing that message.

You can help by taking a look at your club logo. Do you see your club name along with the Rotary or Rotaract logo? Are you using the correct Rotary color palette? Is the Rotary wheel clearly visible, free from other graphics or designed elements? If not, then it might time to update it. It's really easy—just visit the Brand Center to get started.
