





Plan to attend <u>2021 Virtual Convention: Rotary Opens Opportunities</u>, June 12-16. Event registration will open in mid-April and will include a promotional fee of \$49 for 21 days, with an increase afterward to \$65. The cost of each preconvention event is \$20. Both the convention and preconvention events include access to the House of Friendship.

The event will connect you, virtually, with members around the world. It will open new opportunities to learn and to engage with the family of Rotary, near and far. Together, we'll inspire action, strengthen our commitments, work on our challenges, and celebrate our successes.

It has been a busy 2021 so far and very productive.

Here are incoming Rotary International President Shekhar's initiatives for 2021-2022 that were announced to us at International Assembly in February and the new theme, Serve To Change Lives!

President-elect Shekhar's key messages to clubs:

- 1. Inspire to **Serve to Change Lives**. Service is to care for others and share with others. It is about thinking of others before you think of yourselves. Caring and sharing is the mission of life itself, and beyond.
- 2. Each club is encouraged to host a Rotary Day of Service.
- Focusing on diversity and empowering girls by ensuring their access to education, resources, services, and opportunities so that future generations of women leaders will have the tools they need to succeed. Mehta asked members to use Rotary's belief that diversity, equity, and inclusion is critical in all we do as a compass to guide this work.
- 4. To be able to do more through service, Rotary needs to increase membership, Mehta said. Membership has hovered around 1.2 million for the past two decades. He challenged the incoming governors to be catalysts in their districts to help increase membership to 1.3 million by 1 July 2022. Mehta's Each One, Bring One initiative asks every member to bring one person to join Rotary within the next 17 months.




Rotary Extends Vaccine Expertise

As Rotary members continue the fight against polio, they're also responding to the COVID-19 health crisis in communities affected worldwide.

Rotary is ready to use its expertise in distributing polio vaccine and communicating about vaccine efficacy to assist local health authorities in promoting and delivering COVID-19 vaccinations.

Rotary International President Holger Knaack and Foundation Trustee Chair K.R. "Ravi" Ravindran have called on Rotary members to take action on a number of levels. They point to Rotary's record of doing the same in 2014 when an Ebola outbreak in Nigeria was stopped when the government health ministry recruited health experts in polio to train 150 contact tracers who visited thousands to check them for symptoms.

With decades of experience from working to eradicate polio, Rotary members can also play a key role in publicizing the power of vaccines.



Promotion of **World Immunization** Week, April 24-30, is one near-term opportunity for Rotary clubs to raise awareness of the importance of vaccines and the critical need to continue supporting polio vaccinations even while protecting people against the coronavirus.

Rotary Opens Opportunities

Global Grant recipient now epidemiologist



March 11, 2021, marked the first anniversary of the World Health Organization's declaration of the COVID-19 pandemic. During this past year, epidemiologists, professionals who investigate outbreaks and disease control measures, among other things, have worked tirelessly to combat this deadly threat. Among those on the front line is the 2018 Global Grant recipient from District 6080, Ashley Schwarzer, who was sponsored by the Jefferson City West Club.

Ashley's path to becoming an epidemiologist began in a class on the evolution of infectious diseases at Yale College. She confesses that she became fascinated, studying bacteriophage evolution for her undergraduate thesis project. A year following her graduation, she

followed that interest on a fellowship from the National Institutes of Health to work at the Rocky Mountain Laboratories, a prestigious infectious disease research institute. Among her assignments was research on two familiar disease agents: ebolavirus and *Yersinia pestis*, the bacterium that causes plague. The laboratory research became an epiphany; she knew she wanted a career which would directly impact people and populations.

Epidemiology merged with Ashley's interests in infectious diseases. She applied for District 6080 Global Scholar Grant, which was jointly funded by the District and the Rotary Foundation. The application process was a very competitive path, since she rose from the local, district and international competition. Her experiences in the Rotary Youth Exchange, a Fulbright Fellowship, undergraduate work at Yale and a fellowship with National Institutes of Health complemented her pursuit of a Master of Science in Epidemiology at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, a global leader in the public health field.

The generous grant from the Rotary Global Scholar program funded the tuition for her chosen coursework, which focused on epidemiological methods and communicable disease control. The Jefferson City native studied alongside peers from all over the world and completed a final project describing the spatial distribution of a deadly parasitic disease, visceral leishmaniasis (VL), in India.

The Rotary grant provided Ashley with the resources to gain skills essential to combatting infectious diseases, such as COVID-19. One year after graduation, she was applying her education as an epidemiologist. Ashley currently works for a county in Colorado, advising school and childcare facilities on guidelines and their response to COVID-19 cases, as well as investigating outbreaks in these facilities. It is expected that these work responsibilities will assist the management of the changing landscape of the pandemic and improve the health of the world.

(Not-so) Mid-Winter BBQ Slated for April 9 in JC




Children in Callaway County will learn about peace and peaceful solutions to conflict, thanks to the Rotary Club of Fulton.

Tips for improving your public speaking skills

Being a great public speaker has nothing to do with your personality, with overcoming shyness or learning to act confident. It's a technical skill that nearly anyone can acquire, just like cooking.

A simple formula

Whether you're preparing for a TED talk on leadership or getting ready to tell your boss why you deserve a raise, you must first define two things:



- Your audience: Who are they? How do they view the world or the situation? What do they already know about you and your topic? What will they benefit from listening to you talk?
- Your purpose: Why are you speaking to them? What do you want them to know? Why is it important? What are you trying to get them to do?

Then, it's time to distill your message. An effective method is to use this simple, 15-word sentence: As a result of my [talk], they will understand [this], and respond by [doing that].

Tips for preparing your speech

1. Memorize your introduction and conclusion. Brain freeze occurs most commonly during those awful seconds when you first face a crowd.

2. It's not about you. Every decision you make must demonstrate that you're talking for your audience's benefit, not yours. (Just think how it feels to listen to someone prattling away about something that you don't care about.)

3. Do everything you can to help them hear and understand you. People are bad at listening. Use short words, sentences and paragraphs to express your ideas; physical, concrete and vivid images that appeal to the senses; and active verb choices in place of abstract or passive language.

4. Don't drown your audience in data. If your talk relies on heavy data, be sure to explain what that data means — on a human level. People want to know how you think, feel, and believe. That's why you're in the same room (or on Zoom) with them, instead of sending the data by email.

5. Eliminate anything that doesn't clearly support your purpose. If a slide, statistic, joke, or anecdote doesn't serve your goal, cut it.

6. Record yourself or practice in front of real people — **or both, if you can.** This will be painful. But it's better to hate yourself *before* your speech, rather than during (and probably for a long time after) your speech.
