

of the Sunrise members, a large donation of items was provided for the kids in need in the Springfield area. The onsite service project consisted of the members folding new clothing inventory and putting together hygiene kits.

These projects were made possible by the dedication of the Springfield Sunrise Rotary Local Service Projects Chair, Dr. Sandy Rice, and the service committee

members. Through their excellent planning of the service projects, the Springfield Sunrise Rotary Club continues to build partnerships with community organizations and members.

Rotary Clubs to Sponsor Poker Run for Charity

Mid-Missouri Rotary Clubs will collaborate May 13 to host a community Poker Run. Organized by the Rotary Club of Fulton, the event will raise money for Rotary's charitable causes, including Therapy Paws and K-9s on the Front Line.

Therapy Paws works with children and K-9s on the Front Line works with veterans in crisis. Therapy Paws' mission is to provide and coordinate with canine handlers to utilize trained therapy dogs to aid children in trauma and at-risk youth experiencing extreme stress and anxiety. K9s on The Front Line provides certified, trained service dogs to military veterans who

are affected by PTSD and/or TBI (traumatic brain injury). Both are 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations.

Rotary clubs teaming up for the Poker Run are Columbia South, Rocheport, Boonville, Jefferson City Evening and Fulton.

Registration for the Poker Run is available online at www.Fultonrotary-mo.org at a cost of \$20 per person. Participation is not limited to the driver; each person in the vehicle can play.

The run begins at Head Motor Company, 5708 Freedom Dr., along I-70 in Columbia. Registration is at 9:30 a.m. with departure at 10 a.m. A light breakfast will be provided. Additional stops are in Rocheport, Boonville, Jefferson City and Fulton.

Riders will collect stamps at each stop and draw a hand of cards at the final stop. Whoever has the best poker hand wins.

A car show, hosted by the Rotary Club of Fulton, will be held at the last stop, Ohana Pizzeria in Fulton. Awards will be given for best motorcycle, car, jeep, truck, People's Choice and overall show winner. Vehicles can be registered for \$20 at www.FultonRotary-mo.org. Ohana's will have food and drink specials for sale, and the band Hot Mess will perform, 1:30-3:30 p.m.

"Cash prizes, community support, fellowship and service make for a great day," Stephanie Vollmer, Fulton Rotary fundraising chair, said.

How to Create a My Rotary Account in Easy Steps

How to create a My Rotary Account

First you log onto the Rotary International website, rotary.org and click on My Rotary at the top of the page.

Rotary Dashboard

Next click on register for an account. The register and sign in options are noted as you see on the screen and also at the top right hand of the page.

First Time User

If you already have a My Rotary account, then you obviously just need to enter your email and password and sign into the website. If you don't have a My Rotary account, you will need to create an account.

Account Registration

Once you enter your name, email and the fact that you are over 18 and click on continue, an email will be sent to you with a link to activate your account.

Completing the registration

After clicking on the link you received in your email, your account will be activated. You can then complete the registration by setting up a password and any security questions of your choosing. Then you click on create account.

Account Set up

Lastly, by clicking Continue, you are now set up on My Rotary.

Rotary Learning Center Offers Courses on Many Topics

Learning Center on My Rotary

The Rotary Learning Center is full of courses on any Rotary topic you'd like to learn more about. You can find the learning center on the Rotary website under the Learning and Reference tab. After clicking the Learning Reference tab, the Learning Center is the fifth choice and it will direct you to the Course Catalog.

Course Catalog

There are many topics to choose from depending on which subject is most important to you and your club. When selecting Club Leadership, you are directed to many courses that are beneficially to Club Presidents such as Working with your club Leadership Team.

Club Leadership Courses

There are 11 Club President Basics courses that can be done to help aid you as Club President. And, Club President Intermediate offers 10 more courses at an advanced level. Each of these take about half a day to complete them all. The courses go quickly, and you can do them at your own pace. These are free to all Rotarians and can aid any officer in your clubs to get new ideas or develop a new plan for a particular area.

Our Image Matters – Using the Rotary Brand Center

Accessing the Rotary Brand Center

First, go into your "My Rotary" account. Then select the "News & Media" tab at the top of your screen. Finish by clicking on the Brand Center at the bottom of the page.

Overview

The Brand Center Welcome page has all the tabs you need to get started along the top of the page.

You can also click on one of the boxes at the bottom of the page. Everything you need is compartmentalized into these tabs.

Our Image Matters

Awareness of Rotary is high when it comes to our members. However, the public understanding of who we are, what we do, and the value we bring to communities is concerningly low. This is why our Image Matters! Think about it for a minute. No matter where you are in the world or what language you speak, the Rotary logo is universal. It's what unites us around the world. Rotary clubs can tap into the strength of this connection by using a consistent club logo. The more unified our voice is, the greater our impact will be.

Our Image Matters in detail

Once you click on the Our Image Matters tab, you're going to see information about our image and a Downloads section. In the Downloads box there are multiple documents you will find valuable. The first two listed are Identity at a Glance and Voice and Visual Identity Guidelines. These documents show a quick glance of the Rotary logos and go over the official Rotary colors. You'll learn about Rotary messaging, People of Action, proper logo usage, and more.

The messaging guide tells you simple advice for telling Rotary's story in a clear, compelling, and consistent way. It offers talking points about Rotary that you can adapt and build upon.

There is also a Quick Start Guide for Club Websites – You can use this guide to increase the impact of club websites with a consistent look and feel.

Guidelines

When you click on the Guidelines, you'll see that Rotary has guidelines for almost any situation. The most important things to know are the Areas of Focus, and Radio, Television and Social Media Guides.

Areas of Focus

Just as a reminder, Rotary has 7 areas of focus. For many years we have supported clean water, peace, health, disease prevention, literacy, and economic development. Our newest area of focus is to protect the environment.

Logos

Under Logos – you can download high-resolution logos and Rotary graphics. Under this tab you will also have the color palette you need to use when designing logos.

Different logos

These are different Rotary logos and People of Action logos.

The Masterbrand can be in displayed in two tones or in the one color. The Masterbrand is the word Rotary followed by the wheel. You can have, for example, the People of Action under the word Rotary or on the other side of the wheel.





The Rotary Wheel is the mark of excellence and **should not be used by itself**, but rather with the word Rotary or End Polio Now or the Rotary Foundation.

There is also what is called the Lock Up Logo – for example, this one with Rotary masterbrand and People of Action. Lock Ups can be used for other purposes; be sure to follow the guidelines in the Brand Center.



Outdated Logos

This is what you will **not** see on the brand center. These are old logos and Rotary International has deleted all these logos from its brand center and all of its public image platforms and correspondence. **If you are still using any of these logos, please replace them on your social media. And faze them out on your printed materials and banners as you run out of them.** Review the Rotary Brand on all your social media and printed material. Be especially careful in developing your ads & fliers for your fundraising. Be sure you are using the correct branding.



Other Logos

These are the Rotary Foundation logos and End Polio Now logos. The End Polio Now can either have the Mark of Excellence or be just by itself.





Ads

This is the area where you can download online, print, outdoor, and radio ads to promote Rotary in your community.

The online ads are materials already designed that have our action verbs in them. (Together WETransform, Learn, Save Lives, Promote Peace, Mentor, Fight Hunger, Empower, Transform,

Inspire, Connect, and End Polio) All this is ready for Facebook, Instagram, digital banners, and twitter. All you will need to do is upload to the platform you desire.

The print ad section includes print-ready ads in various sizes. Like the online ads, these already have our People of Action verbs overlaid on the ad.

The outdoor ad section includes print-ready ads for billboards and other outdoor signage.

The radio ad section includes multiple generic radio ads that work well for any community. You can download audio files and radio scripts to send to your local radio station.

Images and Videos

Images play an important part in telling Rotary's story, so be sure to select photos that reflect Rotary's work and membership or show Rotarians as People of Action. This section includes dozens of high-quality photos depicting Rotary's work around the world in all of our areas of focus. You could use these in a people of action campaign and attach one of the People of Action "Together We" verbs, such as Transform or Inspire to a picture. You see on your screen the ten action verbs currently available in the Brand Center.

Pictures

You see Action, Connection and Engagement in these pictures. Those are the types of pictures you want to use in your media campaigns.

Videos

The video section includes pre-recorded impactful videos that Rotary has already put together. There are several video lengths to choose from. There is a video promoting service learning for our youth, polio infrastructure, peace initiatives and more. You can share these videos on social media, show at meetings or even talk to your local PBS or tv stations about airing. These videos help inspire people to be part of something that is bigger than themselves. There is even a step-by-step video on how to make a club logo!

Materials

The Materials section is where you'll find templates for business cards, PowerPoint presentations, letterhead, virtual backgrounds and more.

Templates

Club Resources include the templates for Business Cards, letterhead etc. You can also Create Your Own Club Brochures, Promotional cards, and People of Action print ads. Promotional Resources include: news releases, media advisories, letters to the editor, event fliers, and banners.

What's New?

Rotary Voices is a newer addition to the Brand Center. Rotary Voices can be found on the bottom of the first page of the Brand Center page. It is under "What's New." It talks about why you should care about Rotary Branding? There are articles from Rotarians from around the world that are well known for their expertise on Rotary Branding. The really interesting thing about this page is you can comment and ask questions in a somewhat interactive way.
